## BAWDSEY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

**Mary Warner's Educational Foundation:** The trustees of the charity will make fresh grants to students in September. The grants are for students under 25 who need financial assistance and covers young people at school/college/university/other institutions of further education approved by the board including technical and professional. It can also cover clothing/tools/instruments/travel expenses/books to assist with education. **Bonfires:** Concerns have been expressed recently about the lighting of bonfires in the village. Suffolk Coastal District Council gives specific advice on this matter. *"Lighting a bonfire should be a last resort when there is no other suitable means of disposal. Bonfires produce smoke, toxic chemicals and can cause annoyance to neighbours. **East Anglian One Offshore Windfarm:** Work is due to begin on 7 July. The Parish Council has received notice of a temporary traffic order to limit speeding to 30mph along Ferry Road from the entrance to Bawdsey Hall for approximately 120m north bound and 590m south bound for safety reasons, due to additional large vehicles accessing Iberdrola construction sites. **A plea from the Patient Participation Group:** Shockingly 94 surgery appointments were missed between 1 January-31 March, that's one EVERY day and equates to nearly 22 hours of consultation time. Disappointingly the numbers have been increasing recently. With ever mounting demand on surgeries this is a serious problem. To address this situation other surgeries use the football referee system, ie two yellow cards as warnings and a red card as a sending off, meaning removal from the patient list. Locally this would mean registering with a doctor in Woodbridge. Whilst not considering this action at present, missed appointments are being noted on patient records for future reference. Our surgery sends out reminders to mobile phones for forthcoming appointments. If you have a mobile phone, please ensure the number is given to the receptionist? A quick phone call is all it takes. ## SWIFTS IN WOODBRIDGE – PLEASE CONTRIBUTE TO OUR 2017 SURVEY

Join the RSPB Woodbridge Local Group for the third year of our campaign to Save Our Swifts. In 2017 we are looking for swift nest sites either in roofs or nest boxes. From recent surveys we have gathered information from Woodbridge and 10 of the surrounding villages. We have recorded 25 houses with nesting swifts totalling 55 nests. We are sure that there are many more nest sites waiting to be recorded. We'd like to hear from observers in Woodbridge and nearby villages but, particularly Woodbridge, Wickham Market, Saxmundham, Bawdsey, Bredfield, Shottisham, Orford, Hasketon, Snape, Benhall, Sternfield, Great Glemham and Waldringfield. Between early May and early August if you see swifts flying at roof level, particularly around the eaves, this could be a nest site. They may fly directly into a hole or through a loose tile into the nest. If it is your house you may hear them from the upstairs rooms. Another sign of breeding swifts is 'screaming parties' where groups of birds fly around in a tight group, at or just above roof-top height. This year we are working with Save Our Swifts, the Suffolk group which is aiming to record all swift nest sites in Suffolk by 2020 so that we can contribute to the national picture of swift numbers. One reason for swift decline is the loss of nest sites on buildings, through modernisation. Many roofs are now designed to exclude swifts by blocking up entry points. We are raising awareness among builders, developers and home-owners about the need to allow swifts entry points into roofs. We are selling swift nest boxes for £20.00 from the RSPB Woodbridge Group's monthly meetings on the first Thursday in the month from October to May at Woodbridge Community Hall.
