PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Speeding: Speeding through the village has worsened recently. Those at the Annual Parish Meeting called for a SID to be installed to deter speeding. A decision regarding the purchase of a SID device will be made at May's Annual General Meeting on Wednesday 16 May. There were also those in favour of a voluntary Speedwatch Scheme where speeding motorists have their registration numbers reported to the Police. Rob Johnson is willing to coordinate a team of volunteers who are trained by the Police. Anyone willing to take part should contact him on 411185 or email design@redrocketwebdesign.co.uk. There is not one single type of motorist involved in speeding but vehicles with the PGL logo have been identified. PGL is keen to cooperate in this matter so if you see a speeding PGL vehicle, please give details of the car (colour/make/number plate) and the time it was seen to the Clerk on 410198/email bawdsey.pc@hotmail.co.uk. She will phone PGL who will be able to identify the driver.

Village Sign: At the APM Andrew Block thanked villagers for their responses to the proposed new village sign. Although there was a slight majority in favour of the radar tower design, it was felt a more traditional alternative should also be presented to reflect other views. Accordingly a second design will be drawn up and both will be on display at the village fete for villagers to decide which they favour.

Police Visit: The police will be in the lay-by near the Village Hall on Tuesday 1 May between 2.00-3.30pm. If you have any particular policing concerns, do go and have a word with them. We are fortunate they still visit albeit less frequently than before.

Annual General Meeting: The Parish Council AGM, the first in the new financial year, will take place on Wednesday 16 May, 7.00pm in the village hall. All welcome. The agenda will be published at least three days before the meeting. All PC papers are published on the website.

Orwell Housing Development: The Parish Council's response to this development can be read on the East Suffolk Planning Portal accessed through the village website or by typing in http://planningpublicaccess.waveney.gov.uk/online-applications/. The relevant reference number is DC/18/1311/FUL.

Village Website: After an upgrade the website became disorganised and some items disappeared. Worse, the website team didn't know how the new system worked. After some training, they have mastered the key controls and normal service has been resumed. Hope you like the new look. Comments or items you want to publish are welcome.

Closure of Ferry Road: As part of the windfarm works, Ferry Road will be closed from 14-20 May 2018 while a trench is dug across the road to allow cables to be passed from the seaward site to the River Deben. A TO15 traffic control system will be implemented and the road will be closed to road users. When a vehicle/pedestrian approaches the works, contractors will continue working before making the work-site passable which will take up to 15 minutes. Steel road plates will be placed over any open trench to allow vehicles to safely pass. You will not be held up for more than 15 minutes before being allowed to pass through. Ferry Road will be fully accessible outside the working hours of 0700-1900.

WILD VILLAGES

Enjoying the Wildlife in Bawdsey, Alderton, Hollesley and Boyton
It's all about the birds and the bees this month, and we have FREE SEEDS to give away. Our next event is Birds by Song, meeting at Boyton RSPB Reserve, Saturday 19 May at 9.00am. Come along and see if you can tell your Robin from your Wren, your Sedge Warbler from your Cetti's Warbler.

We'll meet at Banter's Barn (TM388475) and have a walk around the superb Boyton Marshes RSPB Reserve, looking and listening for summer visitors, and anything else we can see.

There will be further events, on the wildlife associated with sea-walls and glow-worms, in June and July. Look out for details.

Even if you're inclined to think that all insects are a nuisance, you have to like the pollinators. Without the industrious bees, hoverflies and other insects there would be no strawberries, apples, tomatoes and virtually no flowers. Sadly they seem to be in decline. That is why Wild Villages is launching **Bees Please!** We want to encourage as many of you as possible to take a few simple steps to lend a helping hand. Visit our webpage (www.groundwork.org.uk/wild-villages) and download the simple guide. If you have any problems, let me know and I'll send you a copy.

In conjunction with Boyton Community Group, and courtesy of a seed pack from Grow Wild, we will be doing our bit by sowing seeds of plants for pollinators at Boyton Herb Garden, outside the village hall in the middle of the village. Come along on Saturday 5 May at 10.30am, to prepare the ground and then plant the seeds. Coffee and cake will be available at the hall, as the event coincides with the regular monthly coffee morning.

We also have lots of wildflowers seeds to give away, as well as other goodies such (as '2 for 1' tickets to Kew Gardens. Please get in touch if you want any of these.

For those that are keen on pollinators, whether you take our seeds or not, it would be great if you could spend some time recording the insects that your plants attract. The Centre for Ecology and Hydrology (CEH) are running a very simple citizenscience project, the UK Pollinator Monitoring Scheme. It includes a very simple survey called FIT Count (flower insect timed count), which would not take much time, add to your knowledge, contribute to science and be great fun. SWIFTS IN WOODBRIDGE - PLEASE CONTRIBUTE TO OUR 2018 SURVEY

Join the RSPB Woodbridge Local Group for the fourth year of its campaign to Save Our Suffolk Swifts. We are looking for swift nest sites either in roofs or nest boxes. From previous surveys we have gathered information from Woodbridge and 10 surrounding villages. By the end of 2017, we had recorded 72 nests in 33 sites. We are sure that there are many more nest sites waiting to be recorded.

Between early May and early August if you see swifts flying at roof level, particularly around the eaves, this could be a nest site. You may see them flying directly into a hole or through a loose tile into the nest. If it is your house you may hear them from the upstairs rooms.

Another sign of breeding swifts is 'screaming parties' where groups of birds fly around in a tight group, at or just above roof-top height. We would like to hear about nest sites and screaming parties. So please email your observations to: woodbridge.swifts@gmail.com. For more information about swifts, swift websites, leaflets and our meetings, visit our website: www.rspb.org.uk/groups/woodbridge

All the records you send will be entered onto the Suffolk Biodiversity Information Service and RSPB websites, thus making a major contribution to the national picture of swift numbers and distribution. It is thought that one reason for swift decline is the loss of nest sites on buildings, through modernisation. Many roofs are now deliberately designed to exclude swifts by blocking up entry points. So we are doing all we can to raise awareness among builders, developers and home-owners about the need to allow swifts entry points into our roofs. They are charming visitors; those who have them feel privileged to share their roof spaces with them for the summer months. We want to encourage as many people as possible to install swift nest boxes on their houses to compensate for this loss. You can obtain nest boxes (£20.00) and leaflets from the RSPB Woodbridge Group's monthly meetings on the first Thursday in the month from October to May at Woodbridge Community Hall. Please go to the Links section of the Group website to access leaflets on line through the Swift Conservation and Suffolk Wildlife Trust websites.
